

# South Sudan: Humanitarian funding update (31 December 2012)

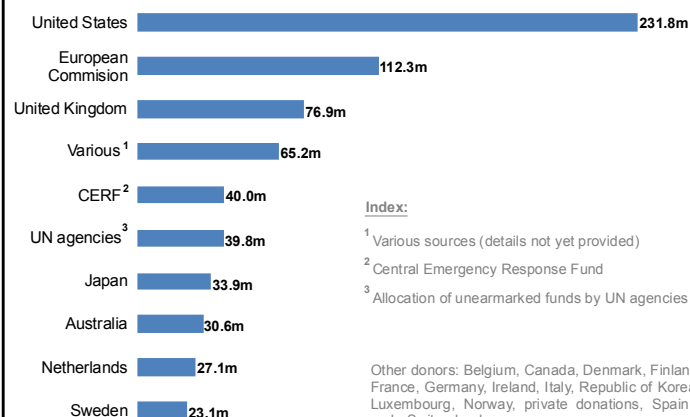


**Humanitarian partners appeal for US\$1.18 billion to meet emergency needs in South Sudan for 2012.**

At the beginning of the year, humanitarian partners appealed for \$763 million for South Sudan. Funding needs have increased significantly over the year, due to worsening food security and a continued arrival of refugees from Sudan's Blue Nile and South Kordofan states.

A legacy of civil war, political tensions with Sudan and chronic underdevelopment impact heavily on the ability of the new state to provide basic services and respond to humanitarian needs, rendering communities vulnerable to the effects of insecurity, displacement, returns, food shortages, outbreaks of disease and seasonal floods.

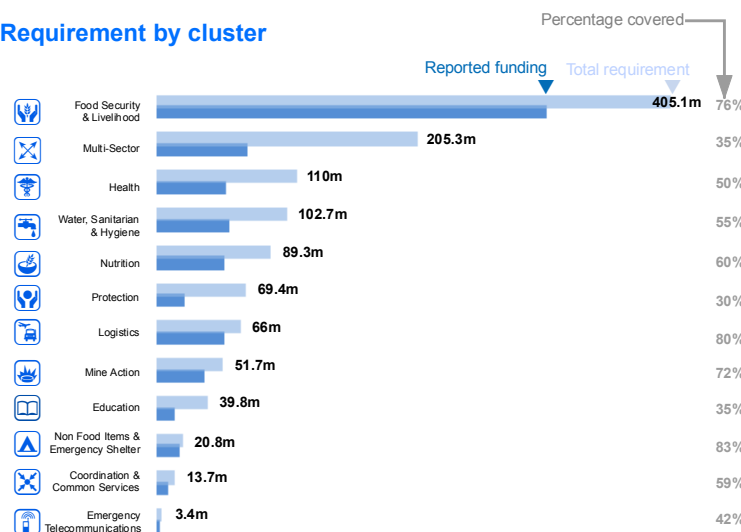

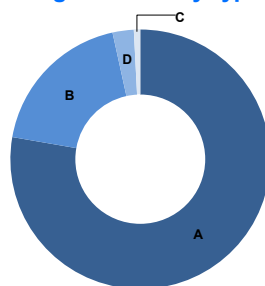

## Funding received by type of organization

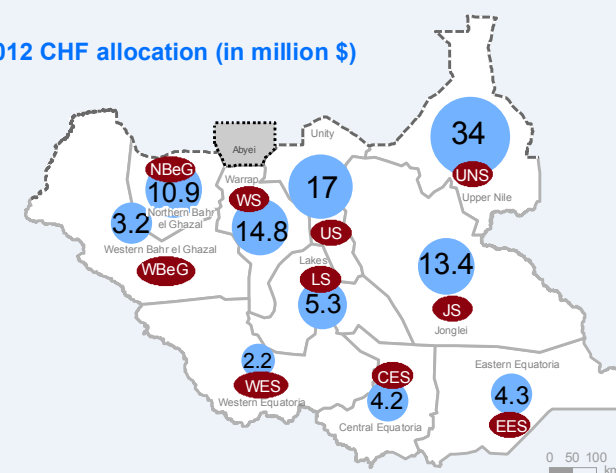

## Common Humanitarian Fund (CHF)

The CHF is intended to improve the humanitarian response by providing rapid, flexible and predictable funds for humanitarian action. It also aims to strengthen the planning and coordination process and channel funds towards the most urgent needs. Moreover, it is a means of ensuring that funds are available for rapid responses to unforeseen needs.
